As we observe the last couple weeks of Lent, prepare for Holy Week, and celebrate Easter Sunday, let us examine how we can continue to be committed to our faith. The three traditional pillars of Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. These are certainly not limited to the season of Lent, and can be practiced throughout the year. Lent is about conversion, and turning ourselves and our lives over to Christ and His way of life. Prayer draws us closer to the Lord, and fasting is often an aid to prayer, linked to our concern for others who are suffering and/or in need. Through almsgiving, we show our care for those in need, as well as express our own gratitude to the Lord for all He has given us. During Holy Week, we celebrate Palm Sunday and Holy Thursday, commemorate Good Friday, and remember the events of Holy Saturday. On Sunday, we celebrate Easter as Christ's resurrection from the dead marking the fulfillment of God's promise to all of mankind. Additionally, Easter Sunday is the beginning of the Easter season of the liturgical year.

As we move through this season, and always, let us be reminded of the love that God has for us, the sacrifice and suffering that Jesus endured for us, and the teachings of our Catholic faith that can help unite us as human beings. Let this be a time to repair our hearts, cleanse our minds, renew and restore our faith, repent our sins, and seek to spend time in true prayer with the Lord to help us carry out His will for us. Let us always remember to be grateful.

As you enter the Lake Avenue gates at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, we invite you to visit The Garden of the Sepulchre. There you will find three large wooden crosses, a granite representation of Christ's Tomb, the Stations of the Cross and a life size replica of Michelangelo's Pieta. As you visit, think of the great sacrifice that Christ made for all of us.

We invite you to pray, meditate, and recall what we are truly celebrating, not only during this Holy Season, but in all the days of our life.

The miracle of the resurrection of Christ is the most important miracle of the Christian faith. As we celebrate this miracle, let us remember the Beatitudes. The Beatitudes are a set of teachings and blessings that come from the opening versus of the Sermon on the Mount delivered by Jesus. The messages found in the Beatitudes describes the foundation of our Christian faith. These messages inspire us to live according to the traits Jesus describes.

BLESSED ARE THE POOR IN SPIRIT, FOR THEIRS IS THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN. BLESSED ARE THEY WHO MOURN. FOR THEY WILL BE COMFORTED. BLESSED ARE THE MEEK, FOR THEY WILL INHERIT THE LAND. BLESSED ARE THEY WHO HUNGER AND THIRST FOR RIGHTEOUSNESS, FOR THEY WILL BE SATISFIED. BLESSED ARE THE MERCIFUL, FOR THEY WILL BE SHOWN MERCY. BLESSED ARE THE CLEAN OF HEART. FOR THEY WILL SEE GOD. Saint Catherine of Siena

Born: March 25, 1347 Died: April 29, 1380 Feast Day: April 29



Have you ever seen your guardian angel?

St. Catherine of Siena was gifted with seeing angels as a child. She saw Jesus, Mary, and many other saints. Frequently, she would amaze her mother when she flew up the stairs, with her feet not quite touching the steps. One day, as she was in prayer, Jesus came to her and put a ring with four pearls and a diamond on her hand - a ring no one else could see. From that moment on, she considered herself married to the Lord.

During the Plague of 1374, she treated the sick and cured many of them miraculously through prayer. Many were converted on the spot because of her efforts. She joined the Dominican Order at the age of sixteen as a tertiary, a lay member who would live in the world rather than a convent. Soon after she had many followers. In the Middle Ages, two papal courts existed in Rome and Avignon (France), at a time when Catherine traveled widely and wielded some influence through her letters. Due to St. Catherine's relentless work to establish peace in the Papal States, Pope Gregory XI and his administration returned to Rome as a result of her appeals to the pope. Catherine even served as an ambassador from Florence to help establish peace.

St. Catherine of Siena lived until the age of 33, when a stroke took her life. She left behind some of the most profoundly brilliant writings the Church has ever seen, which led her to be named a Doctor of the Church, a distinction she shares with only three other women (St. Teresa of Avila, St. Thérèse of Lisieux and St. Hildegard of Bingen). Her legacy, significant for many reasons, was all the more momentous being a women who lived during the 14th century.
